









Projector Placement

Your projector is designed to be installed on a wall or ceiling (with the included mount).

You can also place the projector on almost any flat surface (with the optional floor stand) to project an image in a portable setup, or on a lighting track (with the optional lighting track mount).

Keep these considerations in mind as you select a projector location:

- Follow the instructions in the *Installation Guide* to install the projector on a wall or ceiling.
- If installing on a lighting track, use only the optional lighting track mount (ELPMB66).
- If the projector is not mounted, place it on a sturdy, level surface using the optional floor stand (ELPMB55).
- Leave plenty of space around and under the projector for ventilation, and do not place it on top of or next to anything that could block the vents.
- Position the projector within reach of a grounded electrical outlet or extension cord.




Projector Setup and Installation Options

You can set up or install your projector in the following ways:


Mounted on a ceiling or lighting track



Mounted on a wall




Placed on the floor or on a table or portable cart




Note: Use the direct mount (included) only for mounting the projector on a wall or ceiling. If installing on a lighting track, use only the optional lighting track mount (ELPMB66). If you do not mount the projector, use only the optional floor stand (ELPMB55).

Note: Be sure to leave at least the following amount of space around the projector to avoid blocking the air exhaust and intake vents. When installing the projector on a ceiling or wall, make sure it is not close to the air exhaust vent of an air conditioner.





- 1 11.8 inches (30 cm)
- 2 7.8 inches (20 cm)

If you are installing multiple projectors next to each other, be sure to leave at least 20 inches (50 cm) of space between the projectors. Also make sure heated air from an exhaust vent does not go into the air intake vent of another projector.



You can rotate the projection unit 360 degrees horizontally and 90 degrees vertically. You can also tilt the image 90 degrees in either direction.





Make sure to select the correct **Projection** setting in the Extended menu.




Adjusting the Projection Angle

You can adjust the projection angle using the ball joint on the projection unit.


- 1. Turn the projector on.
- 2. Loosen the ball joint screw using the supplied hexagonal wrench. Make sure to support the projection unit while loosening the screw so that it does not move suddenly.



Warning: Do not grip the ball joint with your fingers while loosening the screw or your fingers could get pinched.



3. Tilt the projection unit to adjust the projection angle.



Caution: Make sure the cables do not tangle around the ball joint or you may damage the projector.

4. When you finish, tighten the ball joint screw using the supplied hexagonal wrench. Make sure to support the projection unit so that it does not move.

Caution: Do not force the ball joint to move after tightening the ball joint screw or you may damage the projector.

Projection Distance

The distance at which you place the projector from the screen determines the approximate size of the image. The image size increases the farther the projector is from the screen, but can vary depending on the zoom factor, aspect ratio, and other settings.


Refer to the tables in the *Installation Guide* to determine approximately how far to place the projector from the screen based on the size of the projected image. (Conversion figures may have been rounded up or down.) You can also use the Projection Distance Calculator here (U.S.), here (Canada), or here (Caribbean).



Attaching and Removing the Cable Clips

You can install the cable clips that came with your projector to provide additional support to the power cord and HDMI cable.

- 1. Connect the power cord and HDMI cable to the projector.
- 2. Insert the end of each cable clip anchor into the cable clip slot above the power inlet and **HDMI** port as shown.





- 1 Cable clip slot
- 2 Cable clip anchor
- 3 Power cable clip
- 4 HDMI cable clip

- 3. Place the open cable clips around the power cord and HDMI cable, but do not lock them.
- 4. Slide each cable clip onto the anchors and lock the clips onto the power and HDMI anchors as shown.

To remove the cable clips, open the clips and disconnect the cables. Then pinch the sides of each cable clip anchor and carefully pull them out of the cable clip slots.



Connecting to a Computer for HDMI Video and Audio

If your computer has an HDMI port, you can connect it to the projector using an optional HDMI cable.

Note: To connect a Mac that does not include an HDMI video output port, you need to obtain an adapter that allows you to connect to the HDMI input port on the projector. Contact Apple for compatible adapter options. To connect a smartphone or tablet, you may need to obtain an adapter that allows you to connect to the HDMI input port on the projector. This allows you to mirror your smartphone or tablet screens, watch movies, and more. Contact your device manufacturer for compatible adapter options.

- 1. Connect the HDMI cable to your computer's HDMI output port.
- 2. Connect the other end to the projector's **HDMI** port.



Note: The projector converts the digital audio signal sent from your computer into a stereo analog signal if you are connecting to external speakers. (Make sure the HDMI audio playback device on your computer's audio settings is set to **EPSON PJ**.)



Connecting to an HDMI Video Source

If your video source has an HDMI port, you can connect it to the projector using an optional HDMI cable. The HDMI connection provides the best image quality.

Note: Do not turn on the video source before connecting it to the projector. Doing so could damage the projector.

- 1. Connect the HDMI cable to your video source's HDMI output port.
- 2. Connect the other end to the projector's **HDMI** port.



Note: The projector converts the digital audio signal sent from your video source into a stereo analog signal if you are connecting to external speakers.



Connecting to a Streaming Media Player


You can connect a streaming media player to the projector's **HDMI** port. Connect the USB cable to power the streaming media player from the projector.

Note: To continue supplying power to the streaming media player when the projector is not projecting images, select **Always On/On** as the **DC Out/GPI In** setting in the **Extended** menu.

1. Connect your streaming media player to the projector's **HDMI** port.



- 2. Connect the power supply USB cable to the projector's **DC Out (2.0A)/GPI In** port.
- 3. Connect the other end to the streaming media player's USB port (Type-B).

Connecting to Bluetooth Audio Devices


You can connect your projector to Bluetooth audio devices (A2DP compliant) such as speakers or headphones to output audio from the following sources: **HDMI**, **LAN**, **SD**

To output audio to Bluetooth audio devices, select **On** as the **Bluetooth Audio** setting in the projector's **Settings** menu.


Note: Use only Bluetooth audio devices that support the SCMS-T standard. There may be a delay in the audio output to any Bluetooth audio devices. Bluetooth audio devices are not supported in all countries and regions.

1. Turn on the projector and switch to the image source you want to use.

- 2. Press the **Menu** button on the remote control.
- 3. Select the **Settings** menu and press **← Enter**.



- 5. Select the **On** as the **Bluetooth Audio** setting.



- 6. Turn on pairing mode on the Bluetooth audio device you want to connect to. (See your Bluetooth audio device manual for details.)
- 7. Select Search Bluetooth Device and press Enter.
- 8. Select the Bluetooth audio device you want to connect to and press **Letter**.
- 9. Press **Menu** or **Esc** to exit the menus.

The next time you turn on the projector, the last connected device is automatically connected to the projector. To change the connected device, repeat steps 6-9.

Caution: Do not use the device near any medical equipment or equipment that is automatically controlled, such as automatic doors or fire alarms. Electromagnetic interference from the device may cause such equipment to malfunction and cause an accident.

Note:

- Connect a Bluetooth device that supports copyright protection (SCMS-T).
- You may not be able to connect depending on the standard and type of device.
- Even when connecting within the specified communication distance, connections can be lost due to the status of the signal.
- The communication method for Bluetooth uses the same frequency (2.4 GHz) as wireless LAN (IEEE802.11b/g/n) or microwave ovens. Therefore, if these devices are used at the same time, radio wave interference may occur, the audio may be interrupted, or communication may not be possible. If you do need to use these devices at the same time, make sure there is enough distance between them and the Bluetooth device.
- When using a Bluetooth device and a wireless LAN at the same time, use wireless LAN in the 5 GHz frequency band. If you use wireless LAN in the 2.4 GHz frequency band, radio wave interference may occur, the image and audio may be interrupted, or upload times may be longer.
- You cannot connect multiple Bluetooth devices to the projector at the same time.


Connecting to External Sensor Devices

You can connect external devices such as sensors by using a USB cable to receive the input signal from the sensor devices. See the *EV-115/EV-110 External Sensors Setup Guide* at epson.com/support (U.S.), epson.ca/support (Canada), or latin.epson.com/support (Caribbean) for details (only available in English).

Caution: Incorrect connection could damage the product. Contact a qualified technician to connect the external sensor device.

Note: The projector's **DC Out (2.0A)/GPI In** port cannot receive USB standard signals. You need to prepare the sensor cable so that you can connect it to the **DC Out (2.0A)/GPI In** port, or use a commercially available connector instead. You can also connect other external devices such as buttons and switches.

- 1. Connect the USB cable to your external sensor's output port.
- 2. Connect the other end to the projector's DC Out (2.0A)/GPI In port.


Connecting to External Speakers

To play the sound from your presentation, you can connect the projector to external self-powered speakers. You can control the volume using the projector's remote control.

You can also connect the projector to an amplifier with speakers.

Warning: Do not connect headphones to the projector; the excessive sound pressure may damage your hearing.

- 1. Make sure your computer or video source is connected to the projector with an HDMI cable.
- 2. Locate the appropriate cable to connect your external speakers, such as a stereo mini-jack-to-pin-jack cable, or another type of cable or adapter.
- 3. Connect one end of the cable to your external speakers as necessary.
- 4. Connect the stereo mini-jack end of the cable to your projector's **Audio Out** port.


Adjusting the Projector's Brightness Level

Inserting an SD Card

Insert a commercially available SD card into the projector's SD card slot.

Note: An SD card is required to project from a playlist created using the Epson Projector Content Manager software.

Make sure you use an SDHC card of Class 10 or higher with a maximum capacity of 32GB, or an SD card formatted in FAT16 or FAT32.





Installing Batteries in the Remote Control


The remote control uses the two AA batteries that came with the projector. Replace the batteries as soon as they run out.

Caution: Use only the type of batteries specified in this manual. Do not install batteries of different types, or mix new and old batteries.

1. Remove the battery cover.




2. Insert the batteries with the + and – ends facing as shown.



Warning: Make sure the batteries are inserted in the correct positions. If the batteries are not inserted correctly, they could explode or leak, causing a fire, injury, or damage to the product.

3. Replace the battery cover and press it down until it clicks into place.



Warning: Dispose of used batteries according to local regulations. Do not expose batteries to heat or flame. Keep batteries out of the reach of children; they are choking hazards and are very dangerous if swallowed.

Wired Network Projection

You can project through a wired network. To do this, you connect the projector to your network with an Ethernet cable, and then set up your projector and computer for network projection.

After connecting and setting up the projector, install the projector software. You may need to install it from a software CD, if included, or download the software and manuals as necessary.

Note: If your projector is connected via a LAN (Ethernet) cable to a network that includes a wireless access point, you can connect to the projector wirelessly through the access point using the Epson network software.



To connect the projector to a wired local area network (LAN), use a 100Base-TX or 10Base-T network cable. To ensure proper data transmission, use a Category 5 shielded cable or higher.

1. Connect one end of the network cable to your network hub, switch, or router.

2. Connect the other end of the cable to the projector's **LAN** port.







- Web Control Password lets you enter a password up to 8 alphanumeric characters long for accessing the projector over the web. (Default user name is EPSONWEB; default password is admin.)
- Moderator Password lets you enter a password up to 4 numbers long for accessing the projector as a moderator with the Epson iProjection (Windows/Mac) software or the Epson iProjection app. (No default password.)
- **Projector Keyword** lets you turn on a security password to prevent access to the projector by anyone not in the room with it. You must enter a displayed, randomized keyword from a computer using the Epson iProjection (Windows/Mac) software to access the projector.
- Display Keyword lets you select whether or not to display a projector keyword on the projected image when using the Epson iProjection (Windows/Mac) software to access the projector.
- **Display LAN Info** lets you select how the projector displays network information. You can select an option to display a QR code that lets you quickly connect your iOS or Android devices using the Epson iProjection app.

Note: Use the displayed keyboard to enter the name, passwords, and keyword. Press the arrow buttons on the remote control to highlight characters and press **Letter** to select them.

7. Select the Wired LAN menu and press - Enter.



- 8. If necessary, select IP Settings and press Enter.
- 9. Select your IP Settings as necessary:
 - If your network assigns addresses automatically, select **IP Settings** and turn on the **DHCP** setting.
 - If you must set addresses manually, select IP Settings, turn off DHCP, and then enter the projector's IP Address, Subnet Mask, and Gateway Address as needed.

Note: To highlight the numbers you want from the displayed keyboard, press the arrow buttons on the remote control. To select a highlighted number, press **Lenter**.

- 10. To prevent display of the IP address on the standby screen, turn off IP Address Display.
- 11. To connect the projector to the network using IPv6, select **On** as the **IPv6 Settings** option. Then select the **Auto Configuration** and **Use Temporary Address** settings as necessary.
- 12. When you finish selecting settings, select **Complete** and follow the on-screen instructions to save your settings and exit the menus.
- 13. Press the **LAN** button on the remote control.

The wired network settings are complete when you see the correct IP address on the LAN standby screen.

- 7. Select a number for the SMTP server **Port Number** setting, from 1 to 65535 (default is 25).
- 8. Enter the sender's email address as the **From** setting.
- 9. Choose an **Address Setting** field, enter the e-mail address, and select or deselect the alerts you want to receive there. Your e-mail address can be up to 32 alphanumeric characters long. Repeat for up to three addresses.
- 10. If you are using the PJLink protocol for projector control, turn on the **PJLink Notification** setting and enter the IP address where you want to receive PJLink notifications as the **Notified IP Address** setting.
- 11. When you finish selecting settings, select **Complete** and follow the on-screen instructions to save your settings and exit the menus.



Network administrators can install SNMP (Simple Network Management Protocol) software on network computers so they can monitor projectors. If your network uses this software, you can set up the projector for SNMP monitoring.



- 6. Enter up to two IP addresses to receive SNMP notifications as the **Trap IP Address** settings, using 0 to 255 for each address field.

Note: Do not use these addresses: 127.x.x.x or 224.0.0.0 through 255.255.255.255 (where x is a number from 0 to 255).

7. Enter the SNMP **Community Name** up to 32 alphanumeric characters long.

8. Select the **Others** menu and press **Unit** Enter.



- 9. If you want to use the Secure HTTP protocol to encrypt communication when using Web Control, turn on the **Secure HTTP** setting and import the web server certificate using the **Web Server Cert.** setting.
- 10. If available, select the **Priority Gateway** setting for your network.
- 11. If your network environment uses a Crestron Connected controller, turn on the **Crestron Connected** setting to allow the projector to be detected.
- 12. If your network environment uses an Art-Net communication protocol, turn on the Art-Net setting.
- 13. If you want this projector to receive broadcast messages over the network, turn on the **Message Broadcasting** setting. Administrators can broadcast messages over the network using the Epson Projector Management software.
- 14. When you finish selecting settings, select **Complete** and follow the on-screen instructions to save your settings and exit the menus.

Controlling a Networked Projector Using a Web Browser

Once you have connected your projector to your network, you can select projector settings and control projection using a compatible web browser. This lets you access the projector remotely. You can also edit playlists.

Note: Make sure the computer and projector are connected to the network. When projecting images using a wireless LAN, connect in Advanced connection mode. The web setup and control features support Microsoft Internet Explorer 11.0 or later, Microsoft Edge, Google Chrome, and Safari on networks that do not use a proxy server for connection. You cannot select all of the projector menu settings or control all projector functions using a web browser.


Note: If you set **Standby Mode** to **Communication On** in the Extended menu, you can use a web browser to select settings and control projection even if the projector is in standby mode (the power is off). The **Standby Mode** setting is displayed only if the **DC Out/GPI In** setting is set to **On While Project/Off**. You can also control the projector using a Web browser through the Epson iProjection (iOS/Android) app.





Note: If you are controlling the projector using Art-Net and operating it from the remote control, settings made by the DMX controller or application software may differ from the projector's actual status. If you want to apply all the channel controls to the projector, set Channel 13 to **Cannot control**, then set it back to **Can control**.

Setting Up Web API

You can setup Web API from a Web browser and operate the projector using Web API.

Note: You can authenticate Web API communications using API authentication (Digest authentication). The user name for API authentication is **EPSONWEB**; use the password that is set for **Web Control Password**.

- 1. Open the Epson Web Control from your Web browser.
- 2. Select Developer's Menu.
- 3. Set the **Enable API** setting to **On**.
- 4. Enter one of the following Web APIs to operate the projector:

Note: In the above URLs, enter the IP address for the projector in the <ip> field. For example, a URL instructing a projector with the IP address 192.168.0.2 to playback playlist ID 3 would look like this: http://192.168.0.2/api/v01/contentmgr/playlist/play/3

If secure HTTP is enabled, change the http in the URL to https.



- 3. Select the **Network** menu and press **← Enter**.

- 5. Select the **Others** menu and press **← Enter**.
- 6. Select **On** as the **Secure HTTP** setting.

- 9. Press **Uniter** to display the certificate list.
- 10. Select the certificate you want to import from the displayed list.

A message is displayed prompting you to enter the password for the certificate.

11. Enter the password and press **← Enter**.

The certificate is imported and a completion message appears.



Turning On the Projector

Turn on the computer or video equipment you want to use before you turn on the projector so it can display the image source.

1. Connect the power cord to the projector's power inlet.



2. Plug the power cord into an electrical outlet.

The projector's On/Standby light turns blue. This indicates that the projector is receiving power.

Note: With Direct Power On turned on, the projector turns on as soon as you plug it in.

Note: If the projector is installed in a lighting track (using the optional lighting track mount), the projector enters standby mode as soon as you turn on the lighting track.

3. Press the power button on the projector or remote control to turn on the projector.

The Status light flashes blue as the projector warms up. After about 30 seconds, the Status light stops flashing and turns blue.

Warning: Never look into the projector lens when the laser is on. This can damage your eyes and is especially dangerous for children and pets. If you are using the remote control to turn the projector on, make sure no one is looking into the lens or in front of the projector before turning it on.

Caution: Make sure no objects are blocking the light from the projector lens. Objects blocking the lens for an extended time can melt and light that is reflected back into the lens can cause the projector to malfunction.

If you do not see a projected image right away, try the following:

- Turn on the connected computer or video device.
- Insert a DVD or other video media and press the play button, if necessary.
- Press one of the source buttons (**Spotlight**, **HDMI**, **LAN**, or **SD**) on the remote control to switch to the correct image source.

Note: If the **Auto Power On** setting in the Extended menu is set to **HDMI**, the projector automatically turns on when an HDMI signal is detected.

Change the screen output from the computer when using a laptop.

Turning Off the Projector

Before turning off the projector, shut down any computer connected to it so you can see the computer display during shutdown.

Note: Turn off this product when not in use to prolong the life of the projector. Laser life will vary depending upon mode selected, environmental conditions, and usage. Brightness decreases over time.

Note: When using the A/V Mute feature, the laser is still on. To turn off the laser, turn off the projector.

Press the power button on the projector or remote control.
 The projector displays a shutdown confirmation screen.

Power Off?

Yes: Press (b) button


No : Press any other button

2. Press the power button again. (To leave it on, press any other button.)
The laser turns off and the Status light turns off.

Note: With Epson's Instant Off technology, there is no cool-down period so you can pack up the projector for transport right away (if necessary).

Caution: Do not turn the projector on immediately after turning it off. Turning the projector on and off frequently may shorten the life of the laser.

3. To transport or store the projector, make sure the Status light is off, then unplug the power cord.



Note: If you use the projector continuously for more than 24 hours, or regularly turn it off by shutting off the power outlet, schedule periodic **Light Source Calibration** events in the Extended menu schedule settings.




You can project an evenly rectangular image by placing the projector directly in front of the center of the screen and keeping it level. If you place the projector at an angle to the screen, or tilted up or down, or off to the side, you may need to correct the image shape for the best display quality.

Correcting Image Shape with H/V Keystone

You can use the projector's **Keystone** setting to correct the shape of an image that is unevenly rectangular on the sides.



Note: You cannot combine **Keystone** correction with other image shape correction methods. You can correct horizontal keystone distortion up to 40° right or left, and vertical keystone distortion up to 45° up or down.


1. Turn on the projector and display an image.

Note: You can display a pattern to aid in adjusting the projected image using the Settings menu.

Note: You can also display the pattern by pressing the **Pattern** button on the remote control.

2. Press the **Menu** button.





Note: To provide the best possible image quality, adjust the projector's position to correct the image shape. If this isn't possible, use the Quick Corner setting to correct the image shape.




Note: You cannot combine Quick Corner correction with other image shape correction methods.




You can use the Image Shift feature to adjust the image position without moving the projector.

Note: This feature is not available if the digital zoom is set to the widest setting.

Note: When the projector uses optical zoom, you need to switch to digital zoom by reducing the size of the image until a message is displayed.

3. Press **←** Enter to display the Image Shift screen.

Note: You can shift the image diagonally by pressing any pair of adjacent arrow buttons on the remote control.

5. Press **Esc** to close the Image Shift screen. The screen closes if no operation is performed for approximately 10 seconds.


Note: The Image Shift setting is retained even if the projector is turned off; however, you need to readjust the image position if you change the projector's location or angle.

You can temporarily turn off the projected picture and sound if you want to redirect your audience's attention during a presentation. Any sound or video action continues to run, however, so you cannot resume projection at the point that you stopped it.

2. To turn the picture and sound back on, press **A/V Mute** again.



- 2. To select a playlist, do one of the following:

You can turn on the **Dynamic Contrast** setting to automatically optimize the image luminance. This improves the image contrast based on the brightness of the content you project.

Image Aspect Ratio

The projector can display images in different width-to-height ratios called aspect ratios. Normally the input signal from your video source determines the image's aspect ratio. However, for certain images you can change the aspect ratio to fit your screen by pressing a button on the remote control.

If you always want to use a particular aspect ratio for a certain video input source, you can select it using the projector's menus.



You can change the aspect ratio of the displayed image to resize it.

Note: For HDMI sources, the input signal determines the image's aspect ratio.

- 1. Turn on the projector and switch to the image source you want to use.
- 2. Press the Menu button.
- 3. Select the **Signal** menu and press **← Enter**.



- 4. Select **Aspect** and press **← Enter**.
- 5. Select the aspect ratio you want to use for your input signal and press **← Enter**.

| Aspect ratio setting | Description |
|----------------------|---|
| Auto | Automatically sets the aspect ratio according to the input signal. |
| 16:9 | Converts the aspect ratio of the image to 16:9. |
| Full | Displays images using the full width of the projection area, but does not maintain the aspect ratio. |
| Zoom | Displays images using the full width of the projection area and maintains the aspect ratio of the image (areas that extend beyond the edges of the projected screen are not projected). |
| Native | Displays images as is (aspect ratio and resolution are maintained). |

Note: The aspect ratio setting is available only for HDMI image sources. The available aspect ratio setting varies depending on the input signal.

The projector offers different Color Modes to provide optimum brightness, contrast, and color for a variety of viewing environments and image types. You can select a mode designed to match your image and environment, or experiment with the available modes.

If you always want to use a particular color mode for a certain video input source, you can select it using the projector menus.



- 1. Turn on the projector and switch to the image source you want to use.
- 2. If you are projecting from a DVD player or other video source, insert a disc or other video media and press the play button, if necessary.

3. Press the **Menu** button on the remote control.



- 4. Select the **Image** menu and press **✓ Enter**.
- 6. Press the arrow buttons to select a color mode setting and press **✓ Enter**.
- 7. When you are finished, press **Menu** or **Esc**.


Controlling the Volume with the Volume Buttons

The volume buttons control any external speakers you connected to the projector. You can also control the volume for Bluetooth audio devices connected to the projector.

You must adjust the volume separately for each connected input source.

Warning: Do not start playback at a high volume. Sudden loud noises may cause hearing loss. Always lower the volume before turning off the projector. Gradually increase the volume after turning the projector on.

- 1. Turn on the projector and start a presentation that includes audio.
- 2. To lower or raise the volume, press the **Volume** buttons on the remote control.



A volume gauge appears on the screen.

Note: You can also adjust the Volume setting in the projector's Setting menu.

3. To set the volume to a specific level for an input source, use the projector menus.

You can operate multiple projectors using one remote control for more elaborate presentations. To do this, you assign an identification number to each projector and to the remote control. Then you can operate all the projectors at once or individually.

Setting the Projector ID


If you want to control multiple projectors from a remote control, give each projector a unique ID.

1. Press the **Menu** button.

2. Select the **Extended** menu and press **← Enter**.

3. Select the **Multi-Projection** menu and press **← Enter**.

4. Select **Projector ID** and press **← Enter**.



5. Press the arrow buttons on the remote control to select the identification number you want to use for the projector. Then press **Lenter**.

Repeat these steps for all the other projectors you want to operate from one remote control.

Note: If you don't know the projector's ID, aim the remote control at the projector and press the **ID** button to temporarily display the projector's ID on the screen.



Setting the Remote Control ID

The remote control's ID is set to zero by default so it can operate any compatible projector. If you want to set the remote control to operate only a particular projector, you need to set the remote control's ID to match the projector's ID.

Note: You must set the remote control ID to match the projector ID each time you turn on the projector you have set it to control.

- 1. Turn on the projector you want the remote control to operate with exclusively.
- 2. Aim the remote control at that projector and press the **ID** button on the remote control.
 - The current projector ID is displayed on the screen for about 3 seconds.
- 3. Hold down the **ID** button on the remote control while you press the numeric button that matches the projector's ID. Then release the buttons.



4. Press the **ID** button on the remote control to check if the ID-setting process worked.

You see a message displayed by the projector.

- If the remote control is listed as **On**, the remote control ID is set to operate only the listed projector.
- If the remote control is listed as **Off**, the remote control ID is not set properly. Repeat the steps above to set the ID to match the projector you want to control.


Adjusting the Projector's Brightness Level

When projecting with multiple projectors, you must adjust the brightness setting so that all projectors are equally bright. (Even after adjusting the brightness levels, the brightness of each projector may not match exactly.)

Note: Make sure the Multi-Projection setting is on (**Menu > Extended > Multi-Projection > On**) before you adjust the projector's brightness level.

1. Turn on all the projectors and display the same image.

- 2. Press the **Menu** button.
- 3. Select the **Settings** menu and press **← Enter**.



- 4. Select **Brightness Settings** and press **← Enter**.
- 5. Select the **Light Source Mode** setting and press **← Enter**.

Note: You may need to turn off Multi-Projection (**Multi-Projection** > **Off**) in order to see the Light Source Mode setting options.

- 6. Choose one of the following:
 - Normal: Sets the brightness to the maximum level (estimated life span of the light source is approximately 20,000 hours)
 - Quiet: Sets the brightness to 50% and reduces fan noise (estimated life span of the light source is approximately 20,000 hours)
 - **Extended**: Sets the brightness to 50% and extends the life expectancy of the light source (estimated life span of the light source is approximately 30,000 hours)
 - Custom: Select a custom brightness level between 50% and 100%
- 7. If you select **Custom**, select the **Brightness Level** setting from the Brightness Settings screen and use the left and right arrow buttons on the remote control to adjust the brightness level.

8. Press **Esc** to return to the previous screen.

Note: For the best results in maintaining a constant brightness, set the **Light Source Calibration** setting to **Run Periodically** in the projector's **Reset** menu.



Adjusting Color Uniformity

If the color tone is uneven on each screen, adjust the color tone balance in the Extended menu of each projector. (The color tone may not be uniform even after performing color uniformity.)

Note: If you cannot adjust color uniformity, make sure the **Color Mode** setting is not set to **Dynamic**.

1. Press the **Menu** button on the remote or control panel, select the menu, and press **Left** Enter.



- 2. Select the **Multi-Projection** setting and press **← Enter**.
- 3. Select the Color Uniformity setting and press ← Enter.
- 4. Select **On** as the **Color Uniformity** setting and press **← Enter**, then press **Esc**.

- 5. Select **Adjustment Level** and press **← Enter**.
- 6. Select an adjustment level and press Esc.
- 7. Select **Start Adjustments** and press **← Enter**.
- 8. Select the area you want to adjust and press **Letter**.



9. Select **Red**, **Green**, or **Blue** and press the left arrow button to weaken the color tone or the right arrow button to strengthen the color tone.

Note: The adjustment screen changes each time you press **← Enter**.




- 10. Press **Esc** to return to the area selection screen.
- 11. Repeat steps 8 through 10 for each area, then select **All** to adjust the entire screen.
- 12. Press **Esc** to exit the menus.



You can use the projector's Edge Blending feature to create a seamless image from multiple projectors.




- 1. Press the **Menu** button.
- 2. Select the **Extended** menu and press **← Enter**.
- 3. Select the **Multi-Projection** setting and press **← Enter**.
- 4. Select the **Edge Blending** setting and press **← Enter**.
- 5. Turn on the Edge Blending, Line Guide, and Pattern Guide settings.
- 6. Select the edge you want to blend on each projector and press **← Enter**. You see a screen like this:



- 7. Select the **Blending** setting and select **On**.
- 8. Press **Esc** to return to the previous screen.

9. Select the **Blend Range** setting and use the arrow buttons to select the width of the blended area so that the displayed guides are at the edges of the overlapping area between the two images.



- 10. Press **Esc** to go back to the previous screen.
- 11. Select the **Blend Curve** setting and select a gradient for the shaded area on the projectors.
- 12. When the edges are blended, turn off the **Line Guide** and **Pattern Guide** settings on each projector to check the final settings.
- 13. When you are finished, press the **Menu** button.

You can set up a timetable to simultaneously project a synchronized playlist across multiple (up to 16) projectors.


Note: All projectors that will be involved in synchronized playback must be the same model. If any of the projectors are a different model or have a different resolution, synchronized playback may not be performed properly.



Note: You can create playlists and set timetables for them using the Epson Projector Content Manager software. See the *Epson Projector Content Manager Operation Guide* for details. You can also create playlists using Epson Creative Projection, Epson iProjection (Android/iOS), or a Web browser.

Make sure the name, date, and time settings are correct for all projectors that will be involved in synchronized playback.

1. Insert an SD card containing playlists into each projector's SD card slot.



Press the SD button on the remote control for each projector.
 Synchronized playback starts at the time specified in the playlist timetables.





Caution: Do not place flammable objects in front of the lens. If you schedule the projector to turn on automatically, flammable objects in front of the lens could catch on fire.

Note: The **Schedule Protection** setting in the Password Protection menu must be turned off to schedule an event.

- 5. Select Add New and press ← Enter.

- 8. When you are finished, select **Save** and press **← Enter**.

- 9. To schedule more events, repeat the previous steps as necessary.





 - Clear to delete the selected event.
 - · Add New to add a new scheduled event.

Password Security Types

Password Security Types

You can set up these types of password security using one shared password:

- **Power On Protection** password prevents anyone from using the projector without first entering a password.
- User's Logo Protection password prevents anyone from changing the custom screen the projector can display when it turns on. The presence of the custom screen discourages theft by identifying the projector's owner.
- Network Protection password prevents anyone from changing the network settings in the projector menus.
- Schedule Protection password prevents anyone from changing the projector's time or schedule settings.



Setting a Password

To use password security, you must set a password.

Note: The default password is set to **0000**.


1. Hold down the **Effect** button on the remote control for about five seconds or until you see this menu.



2. Press the down arrow to select **Password** and press **← Enter**.

- 3. Select **Yes** and press **← Enter**.
- 4. Press the number buttons to set a four-digit password.



The password displays as **** as you enter it. Then you see the confirmation prompt.



- To prevent changes to the User's Logo screen or related display settings, select **User's Logo**Protection, press

 Enter, select On, press


 Enter again, and press Esc.
- To prevent changes to network settings, select **Network Protection**, press **← Enter**, select **On**, press **← Enter** again, and press **Esc**.
- To prevent changes to the projector's time or schedule settings, select Schedule Protection, press ← Enter, select On, press ← Enter again, and press Esc.

Note: Be sure to keep the remote control in a safe place; if you lose it, you will not be able to enter the password required to use the projector.


Entering a Password to Use the Projector

If a password is set up and a **Power On Protection** password is enabled, you see a prompt to enter a password whenever you turn on the projector.



You must enter the correct password to use the projector.

1. Use the number buttons on the remote control to enter the password.



Note: The default password is 0000.

The password screen closes.

- 2. If the password is incorrect, the following may happen:
 - You see a "wrong password" message and a prompt to try again. Enter the correct password to proceed.
 - If you have forgotten the password, make note of the **Request Code: xxxxx** number that appears on the screen and contact Epson Support.

- If you enter an incorrect password three times in succession, you see a message telling you that
 the projector is locked. After the message is displayed for 5 minutes, the projector enters standby
 mode. Unplug the projector, plug in the power cord, and turn on the projector. You see a prompt to
 enter the password.
- If you continue to enter an incorrect password 30 times in succession, the projector displays a
 request code and a message to contact Epson Support. Do not attempt to enter the password
 again. When you contact Epson Support, provide the displayed request code and proof of
 ownership for assistance in unlocking the projector.

Saving a User's Logo Image to Display


You can transfer an image to the projector and then display it whenever the projector turns on. You can also display the image when the projector is not receiving an input signal or when you temporarily stop projection (using the A/V Mute feature). This transferred image is called the User's Logo screen.

The image you select as the User's Logo can be a photo, graphic, or company logo, which is useful in identifying the projector's owner to help deter theft. You can prevent changes to the User's Logo by setting up password protection for it.

Note: When you copy the menu settings from one projector to another using the batch setup feature, the user logo is also copied. Do not include any information in the user logo that you do not want to share between multiple projectors.

1. Display the image you want to project as the User's Logo.

2. Press the **Menu** button, select the **Extended** menu, and press **✓ Enter**.



- 3. Select the **User's Logo** setting and press **← Enter**.
- 4. Select **Yes** and press **← Enter**.

You see a selection box overlaying your image.


Note: When you select **User's Logo**, adjustments such as **Keystone** or **Aspect** are temporarily canceled.

5. Use the arrow buttons on the remote control to surround the image area you want to use as the User's Logo and press **← Enter**.

You see a prompt asking if you want to select this image area.

6. Select **Yes** and press **← Enter**. (If you want to change the selected area, select **No**, press **← Enter**, and repeat the last step.)

You see the User's Logo zoom factor menu.



7. Select a zoom percentage and press **← Enter**.

You see a prompt asking if you want to save the image as the User's Logo.

8. Select **Yes** and press **← Enter**.

You see a completion message.

- 9. Press **Esc** to exit the message screen.
- 10. Select the **Extended** menu and press **← Enter**.
- 11. Select **Display** and press **← Enter**.
- 12. Select when you want to display the User's Logo screen:
 - To display it whenever there is no input signal, select **Display Background** and set it to **Logo**.
 - To display it whenever you turn the projector on, select **Startup Screen** and set it to **On**.
 - To display it whenever you press the A/V Mute button, select A/V Mute and set it to Logo.

To prevent anyone from changing the User's Logo settings without first entering a password, set a password and enable User's Logo security.

Using External Sensors

You can execute operations from external sensors connected to the projector.

Depending on the signals from the sensors, you can execute one of the following projector operations that you have already selected in the projector's menu:

- Power On/Power Off
- Execute A/V Mute/Release A/V Mute
- Start Playlist/Stop Playlist
- Source Select
- Light Source Mode: Normal/Light Source Mode: Quiet

See the EV-115/EV-110 External Sensors Setup Guide for details (only available in English).

Caution: Incorrect connection could damage the product. Contact a qualified technician to connect the external sensor device.

Note: Up to two sensors are available at the same time. You can also select settings for a combination of two signals. You need to process the sensor cable so that you can connect it to the **DC Out (2.0A)/GPI In** port. Or, you can use a commercially available connector instead. You can also connect other external devices such as buttons and switches.

- 1. Connect external sensors to the **DC Out (2.0A)/GPI In** port.
- 2. Press the **Menu** button on the remote control, select the **Extended** menu, and press **✓ Enter**.
- 3. Select **DC Out (2.0A)/GPI In Settings** and press **✓ Enter**.
- 4. Select Always On/On as the DC Out/GPI In setting.
- 5. Select **GPI-1 Settings**.
- 6. Select the **Low -> High** setting, and then select one of the following operations to be executed when the sensor signal exceeds a certain voltage:
 - Power On/Power Off to turn the projector on or off.
 - Execute A/V Mute/Release A/V Mute to enable or disable A/V Mute.
 - Start Playlist/Stop Playlist to start or stop playing your playlist from Favorite Playlists. You also need to select the target playlist in the Favorite Playlists setting.
 - Source Select to switch the image source. You also need to select the target source in the Source setting.
 - Light Source Mode: Normal/Light Source Mode: Quiet to switch the Light Source Mode setting.

- 7. Select the **Combination** setting, and then select one of the following options:
 - None to always start the operation set in GPI-1 Settings regardless of the GPI-2 signal.
 - **GPI-2 Low** to start the operation set in **GPI-1 Settings** when the GPI-2 signal falls below a certain voltage.
 - **GPI-2 High** to start the operation set in **GPI-1 Settings** when the GPI-2 signal exceeds a certain voltage.

Note: You can check the current value for the GPI-1 and GPI-2 signals in the **GPI Info.** menu from **DC Out (2.0A)/GPI In Settings**.

- 8. Select the **High -> Low** setting, if necessary.
- 9. If you need to add a certain amount of time until the selected operation is executed, select **Hold High** or **Hold Low**.

When the sensor signal is maintained continuously for the set time, the operation is executed.

Note: You can select from 0 seconds to 30 minutes for the **Hold High** and **Hold Low** settings.

- 10. Press **Esc** to return to the previous screen, and then select the **GPI-2 Settings** option if necessary.
- 11. When you are finished, press **Menu** to exit the menus.

Copying Menu Settings Between Projectors

After you select menu settings for your projector, you can transfer them to another projector of the same model.

Note: Copy the projector's settings before you adjust the projected image using the projector's image adjustment settings. Any saved User's Logo setting on the projector will transfer to the other projector.

Caution: If the copy process fails due to a power failure, communication error, or for any other reason, Epson will not be responsible for any repair costs incurred.

The following settings will not transfer between projectors:

Network menu settings other than those in the Notifications and Others menus

The following settings will not transfer between projectors if you set the **Batch Setup Range** setting to **Limited**:

- Password Protection settings
- · Network menu settings other than those in the Notifications and Others menus

Note: In addition to the methods covered in this section, you can also copy and transfer settings to multiple projectors over a network using the Epson Projector Management software. See the online *Epson Projector Management Operation Guide* for instructions. You can download the latest software and documentation from the Epson website.



Note: Use an empty SD card. If the card contains other files, the transfer may not complete correctly. The SD card cannot have any security features and must be an SDHC card of Class 10 or higher with a maximum capacity of 32GB, or an SD card formatted in FAT16 or FAT32.


1. Turn off the projector and unplug the power cord from the projector's power inlet.

2. Insert the SD card into the projector's card slot.



Note: Insert the SD card directly into the projector. Do not use a hub or your settings may not be saved correctly.

3. Press and hold the **Esc** button on the remote control as you connect the power cord to the projector's power inlet.



4. When the On/Standby and Status lights are blue, and the Laser and Temp lights are orange, release the **Esc** button.

The lights flash as settings transfer to the SD card. When the lights stop flashing, the On/Standby light turns blue and the projector enters standby mode.

Caution: Do not unplug the power cord or remove the SD card while the lights are flashing. This could damage the projector.

5. Once the projector enters standby mode, remove the SD card.


Transferring Settings from an SD Card

After saving projector settings to an SD card, you can transfer them to another projector of the same model.

Note: Make sure the SD card contains only one settings transfer file from another projector of the same model. The settings are contained in a file called **pjconfdata.bin**. If the drive contains other files, the transfer may not complete correctly.


Do not adjust image settings on a projector until after you transfer settings to it. Otherwise, you may have to repeat your adjustments.

- 1. Turn off the projector and unplug the power cord from the projector's power inlet.
- 2. Insert the SD card into the projector's card slot.



Note: Insert the SD card directly into the projector. Do not use a hub or your settings may not transfer correctly.

3. Press and hold the **Menu** button on the remote control as you connect the power cord to the projector's power inlet.



4. When the On/Standby and Status lights are blue, and the Laser and Temp lights are orange, release the **Menu** button.

The lights flash as settings transfer to the SD card. When the lights stop flashing, the On/Standby light turns blue and the projector enters standby mode.

Caution: Do not unplug the power cord or remove the SD card while the lights are flashing. This could damage the projector.

5. Once the projector enters standby mode, remove the SD card.





- 7. When you finish changing settings on a menu, press **Esc**.
- 8. Press **Menu** or **Esc** to exit the menus.

Projector Maintenance

Your projector needs little maintenance to keep working at its best.

You may need to clean the lens periodically, and clean the air vents to prevent the projector from overheating due to blocked ventilation.

The only parts you should replace are the remote control batteries. If any other part needs replacing, contact Epson or an authorized Epson servicer.

This projector uses a sealed laser light source which does not need servicing and cannot be replaced.

Warning: Before cleaning any part of the projector, turn it off and unplug the power cord. Never open any cover on the projector, except as specifically explained in this manual. Dangerous electrical voltages in the projector can injure you severely.

Warning: Do not try to service this product yourself, except as specifically explained in this manual. Refer all other servicing to qualified servicers.

Cleaning the Lens

Clean the projector's lens periodically, or whenever you notice dust or smudges on the surface.

• To remove dust or smudges, gently wipe the lens with lens-cleaning paper.

• To remove stubborn smudges, moisten a soft, lint-free cloth with lens cleaner and gently wipe the lens. Do not spray any liquid directly on the lens.

Warning: Do not use a lens cleaner that contains flammable gas. The high heat generated by the projector lamp may cause a fire.

Caution: Do not use glass cleaner or any harsh materials to clean the lens and do not subject the lens to any impacts; you may damage it. Do not use canned air, or the gases may leave a residue. Avoid touching the lens with your bare hands to prevent fingerprints on or damage to the lens surface.

Before cleaning the projector case, turn off the projector and unplug the power cord.

To remove dust or dirt, use a soft, dry, lint-free cloth.

 To remove stubborn dirt, use a soft cloth moistened with water and mild soap. Do not spray liquid directly on the projector.

Caution: Do not use wax, alcohol, benzine, paint thinner, or other chemicals to clean the projector case. These can damage the case. Do not use canned air, or the gases may leave a flammable residue.

• Use a vacuum cleaner to clean dust from the slit in the side of the power supply unit.



Cleaning the Air Vents

Clean the projector's air vents if they get dusty, or if you see a message telling you to clean them.

1. Turn off the projector and unplug the power cord.

2. Gently remove the dust using a small vacuum designed for computers or a very soft brush (such as a paintbrush).



Caution: Do not use canned air. The gases may leave a flammable residue or push dust and debris into the projector's optics or other sensitive areas.






Warning: If the battery fluid has leaked, wipe it away with a soft cloth and avoid getting the fluid on your hands. If it gets on your hands, wash them immediately to avoid injury.

3. Insert the batteries with the + and – ends facing as shown.



Warning: Make sure the batteries are inserted in the correct positions. If the batteries are not inserted correctly, they could explode or leak, causing a fire, injury, or damage to the product.

4. Replace the battery cover and press it down until it clicks into place.



Warning: Dispose of used batteries according to local regulations. Do not expose batteries to heat or flame. Keep batteries out of the reach of children; they are choking hazards and are very dangerous if swallowed.

Transporting the Projector

The projector contains precision parts, some of which are glass. Follow the guidelines here to transport, ship, or store the projector safely.

- 1. Remove any equipment connected to the projector.
- 2. Turn off the projector.
- 3. Remove the SD card, if necessary.
- 4. Tighten the ball joint screw completely to prevent the projector from moving during transportation.
- 5. Do one of the following:
 - When transporting the projector a long distance or as checked luggage, pack it in a firm box with cushioning around it and mark the box "Fragile."
 - When shipping the projector for repairs, place it in its original packing materials, if possible, or use equivalent materials with cushioning around the projector. Mark the box "Fragile."

Note: Epson shall not be liable for any damages incurred during transportation.



Solutions When No Image Appears

If no image appears, try the following solutions:

- Press the A/V Mute button on the remote control to see if the image was temporarily turned off.
- Make sure all necessary cables are securely connected and the power is on for the projector and connected video sources.
- Press the projector's power button to wake it from standby or sleep mode. Also see if your connected computer is in sleep mode or displaying a blank screen saver.
- If the projector does not respond when you press any buttons on the projector, an internal error may have occurred in the projector. Contact Epson for help.
- Press the **Menu** button. If the projector menu displays, there may be a problem with the connected video source, cable connection, or port.
- Check the settings on the Signal menu to make sure they are correct for the current video source.
- · Adjust the Brightness setting on the Image menu.
- Adjust the brightness of your projector's light source.
- Make sure the **Light Source Calibration** options in the Reset menu are set correctly.
- Check the **Display** setting to make sure **Messages** is set to **On**.

- If the projector does not respond when you press buttons on the remote control, make sure the remote receivers are turned on.
- For images projected with Windows Media Center, reduce the screen size from full screen mode.
- For images projected from applications using Windows DirectX, turn off DirectX functions.
- If you are projecting from a laptop computer, make sure it is set up to display on an external monitor.
- The projector may not be able to project copyrighted videos that you play back on a computer. For details, see the manual supplied with your computer.
- If you are projecting from the SD card, press one of the favorite playlist numbers on the remote control to display the image.
- If the other solutions do not solve the problem, reset all of the projector settings using the options on the **Reset** menu.

- Check the connection from the projector to your video sources.
- If you are projecting from a laptop computer, make sure it is set up to display on an external monitor.

- If you are projecting from an HDMI source, replace the HDMI cable with a shorter one.
- · Check that the SD card is inserted correctly.
- · Try a different video cable.
- If the other solutions do not solve the problem, reset all of the projector settings using the options on the **Reset** menu.

Displaying From a PC Laptop

If you see the "No Signal" message when you display from a PC laptop, you need to set up the laptop to display on an external monitor.

1. Hold down the laptop's **Fn** key and press the key labeled with a monitor icon or **CRT/LCD**. (See your laptop manual for details.) Wait a few seconds for an image to appear. To display on both the laptop's monitor and the projector, try pressing the same keys again.

Note: On Windows 7 or later, hold down the Windows key and press **P** at the same time, then click **Duplicate**.

- 2. If the same image is not displayed by the laptop and projector, check the Windows **Display** utility to make sure the external monitor port is enabled and extended desktop mode is disabled. (See your computer or Windows manual for instructions.)
- 3. If necessary, check your video card settings and set the multiple display option to **Clone**, **Mirror**, or **Duplicate**.

- Check your computer display settings to disable dual display and set the resolution within the projector's limits. (See your computer manual for details.)
- Check the resolution assigned to your presentation files to see if they are created for a different resolution than you are projecting in. (See your software help for details.)
- Make sure you selected the correct **Projection** setting in the Extended menu.
- If you are passing the video signal through another device, make sure the device is set up correctly, then try connecting the video source directly to the projector.
- Make sure the **Light Source Calibration** options in the Reset menu are set correctly.
- If you are projecting in **Content Playback** mode, make sure you are using the correct **Overlay Effect** setting in the Settings menu.

If a playlist on the SD card does not play, try the following solutions:

- Make sure you saved the playlist to the SD card.
- Make sure the SD card is inserted correctly into the projector.

- Make sure you use SDHC cards of Class 10 or higher with a maximum of 32 GB or SD cards in FAT16 or FAT32 format.

 - Separated from the power cord to prevent interference

- · Make sure the SD card is inserted correctly.
- Check the settings on the projector's Signal menu to make sure they match the video source.
- Select a computer video resolution and refresh rate that are compatible with the projector.
- If you adjusted the image shape using the projector controls, try decreasing the Sharpness setting to improve image quality.

• If you connected an extension power cable, try projecting without it to see if it caused interference in the signal.

If the projected image is fuzzy or blurry, try the following solutions:

- · Adjust the image focus.
- · Clean the projector lens.
- Position the projector close enough to the screen.
- Verify that the throw distance from the projector to your projection surface meets the specifications in the *Installation Guide* included with your mount.
- Position the projector so the keystone adjustment angle is not so wide that it distorts the image.
- Adjust the Sharpness setting to improve image quality.
- If you are projecting from a computer, use a lower resolution or adjust the computer's resolution to match the projector's native resolution, if possible.

If the projected image is too dark or light, or the colors are incorrect, try the following solutions:

- Check your video source settings.
- · Make sure the SD card is inserted correctly.
- Adjust the available settings on the Image menu for the current input source, such as Brightness,
 Contrast, Tint, Color Mode, and/or Color Saturation.
- Make sure you selected the correct Video Range setting on the Signal menu, if available for your image source.
- Make sure all the cables are securely connected to the projector and your video device. If you
 connected long cables, try connecting shorter cables.
- Make sure the Brightness Settings options in the Settings menu are set correctly.
- Position the projector close enough to the screen.
- When using multiple projectors, make sure **Light Source Calibration** in the Reset menu is set correctly in all of the projectors. If light source calibration is performed only in some of the projectors, the white balance and the brightness level of the projected image may differ between the projectors.

Solutions to Sound Problems

If there is no sound from the external speaker when you expect it or the volume is too low or high, try the following solutions:

- Adjust the projector's volume settings.
- · Make sure external speakers are connected.
- Press the A/V Mute button on the remote control to resume video and audio if they were temporarily stopped.

- Check your computer or video source to make sure the volume is turned up and the audio output is set for the correct source.
- Check the audio cable connections between the projector and your video source.
- Check the audio out cable connection between the projector and your external speakers.
- Make sure any connected audio cables are labeled "No Resistance."
- If you are using a Mac and you do not hear sound from an HDMI source, make sure your Mac supports audio through the HDMI port. If not, you need to connect an audio cable.
- If the volume for the computer is set to the minimum while the projector's volume is set to maximum, the sound level may be mixed. Turn up the computer's volume and decrease the projector's volume (when using Epson iProjection [Windows/Mac]).
- HDMI audio is only supported using PCM. Make sure your audio source is set to the PCM setting.
- If you turn the projector on immediately after turning it off, the cooling fans may run at high speed momentarily and cause an unexpected noise. This is normal.

- Make sure the Bluetooth audio device is paired to the projector and not to another device. See your bluetooth device's guide for information about how to reset and disconnect from all bluetooth devices, then try to pair to the projector.
- Make sure the Bluetooth audio device that is paired to the projector supports copyright protection (SCMS-T) and A2DP.
- · Check the volume level on the paired Bluetooth audio device.
- Make sure there are no obstacles between the Bluetooth audio device and the projector and that the Bluetooth audio device is within the specified communication distance. Avoid using the projector near wireless networks, microwave ovens, 2.4 GHz cordless phones, or other devices that use the 2.4 GHz frequency band.

Solutions to Projector Power or Shut-Off Problems

If the projector does not come on when you press the power button or it shuts off unexpectedly, try the following solutions:

- Make sure the power cord is securely connected to the projector and to a working electrical outlet.
- The projector's buttons may be locked for security. Unlock the buttons or use the remote control to turn on the projector.
- If the projector is installed on a lighting track, disconnect it from the lighting track and plug it into a power outlet to make sure it is working.
- If the power button on the remote control does not turn on the projector, check its batteries and make sure the **Remote Receiver** setting is turned on in the projector's menu, if available.
- If the remote receiver setting is off, press and hold the **Menu** button on the remote for at least 15 seconds to restore the default setting.
- The power cord may be defective. Try another power cord. If that doesn't work, disconnect the cord and contact Epson.
- The cooling fans may run in standby status depending on the projector settings. Also, when the
 projector wakes from standby status, the fans may cause an unexpected noise. This is not a
 malfunction.

If the projector does not respond to remote control commands, try the following solutions:

- Check that the remote control batteries are installed correctly and have power. If necessary, replace the batteries.
- Make sure you are operating the remote control within the reception angle and range of the projector.
- Make sure the projector is not warming up or shutting down.
- Check to see if a button on the remote control is stuck down, causing it to enter sleep mode. Release the button to wake the remote control up.
- Strong fluorescent lighting, direct sunlight, or infrared device signals may be interfering with the
 projector's remote receivers. Dim the lights or move the projector away from the sun or interfering
 equipment.
- If available, turn on the remote receiver in the projector's menu system, or check if the remote receiver was turned off.
- If the remote receiver setting is off, press and hold the **Menu** button on the remote for at least 15 seconds to restore the default setting.
- If you assigned an ID number to the remote control to operate multiple projectors, you may need to
 check or change the ID setting (feature not available with all projectors). If you press ID > 0 on the
 remote it should communicate with all projectors.
- If you lose the remote control, you can purchase another from an authorized Epson reseller.

If you are unable to access the projector through a web browser, make sure you are using the correct ID and password, which are case sensitive.

- For the user ID, enter **EPSONWEB**. (You cannot change the user ID.)
- For the password, enter the password set in the projector's Network menu. The default password is admin.
- Make sure you have access to the network the projector is on.
- Make sure you enter the projector's IP address in the web browser address bar and your device is on the same network.
- If your Web browser is set up to connect via a proxy server, the **Epson Web Control** screen cannot be displayed. Make settings for a connection without using a proxy server.
- If you set **Standby Mode** to **Communication On** in the projector's Extended menu, make sure the network device is turned on. After turning on the network device, turn on the projector.

- Make sure you set up the projector e-mail alert settings correctly on the projector's Network Notifications menu or in the network software.
- Set the **Standby Mode** setting to **Communication On** so the network software can monitor the projector in standby mode. Connect to a wired LAN, or to a wireless LAN with the **Connection Mode** setting set to **Advanced**. Change the **Port** setting according to your network environment.

If the projected image contains static during network projection, try the following solutions:

• Check for any obstacles between the access point, the computer, the mobile device, and the projector. If necessary, change their positions to improve communication. Also make sure that they are not too far apart; move them closer together and try to connect again.

- If the wireless connection is slow or your projected image contains noise, check for interference from other equipment, such as a Bluetooth device or microwave. Move the interfering device farther away or expand your wireless bandwidth.
- If the connection speed declines, reduce the number of connected devices.
- If you are using Epson iProjection, you can try adjusting the iProjection settings. See the *Epson iProjection Operation Guide* for more information.



Binding Arbitration and Class Waiver

1. DISPUTES, BINDING INDIVIDUAL ARBITRATION, AND WAIVER OF CLASS ACTIONS AND CLASS ARBITRATIONS

1.1 **Disputes**. The terms of this Section 1 shall apply to all Disputes between you and Epson. The term "Dispute" is meant to have the broadest meaning permissible under law and includes any dispute, claim, controversy or action between you and Epson arising out of or relating to this Agreement, Epson branded products (hardware and including any related software), or other transaction involving you and Epson, whether in contract, warranty, misrepresentation, fraud, tort, intentional tort, statute, regulation, ordinance, or any other legal or equitable basis. "DISPUTE" DOES NOT INCLUDE IP CLAIMS, or more specifically, a claim or cause of action for (a) trademark infringement or dilution, (b) patent infringement, (c) copyright infringement or misuse, or (d) trade secret misappropriation (an "IP Claim"). You and Epson also agree, notwithstanding Section 1.6, that a court, not an arbitrator, may decide if a claim or cause of action is for an IP Claim.

- 1.2 Binding Arbitration. You and Epson agree that all Disputes shall be resolved by binding arbitration according to this Agreement. ARBITRATION MEANS THAT YOU WAIVE YOUR RIGHT TO A JUDGE OR JURY IN A COURT PROCEEDING AND YOUR GROUNDS FOR APPEAL ARE LIMITED. Pursuant to this Agreement, binding arbitration shall be administered by JAMS, a nationally recognized arbitration authority, pursuant to its code of procedures then in effect for consumer related disputes, but excluding any rules that permit joinder or class actions in arbitration (for more detail on procedure, see Section 1.6 below). You and Epson understand and agree that (a) the Federal Arbitration Act (9 U.S.C. §1, et seq.) governs the interpretation and enforcement of this Section 1, (b) this Agreement memorializes a transaction in interstate commerce, and (c) this Section 1 shall survive termination of this Agreement.
- 1.3 **Pre-Arbitration Steps and Notice**. Before submitting a claim for arbitration, you and Epson agree to try, for sixty (60) days, to resolve any Dispute informally. If Epson and you do not reach an agreement to resolve the Dispute within the sixty (60) days), you or Epson may commence an arbitration. Notice to Epson must be addressed to: Epson America, Inc., ATTN: Legal Department, 3131 Katella Ave., Los Alamitos, CA 90720 (the "Epson Address"). The Dispute Notice to you will be sent to the most recent address Epson has in its records for you. For this reason, it is important to notify us if your address changes by emailing us at EAILegal@ea.epson.com or writing us at the Epson Address above. Notice of the Dispute shall include the sender's name, address and contact information, the facts giving rise to the Dispute, and the relief requested (the "Dispute Notice"). Following receipt of the Dispute Notice, Epson and you agree to act in good faith to resolve the Dispute before commencing arbitration.
- 1.4 **Small Claims Court**. Notwithstanding the foregoing, you may bring an individual action in the small claims court of your state or municipality if the action is within that court's jurisdiction and is pending only in that court.
- 1.5 WAIVER OF CLASS ACTIONS AND CLASS ARBITRATIONS. YOU AND EPSON AGREE THAT EACH PARTY MAY BRING DISPUTES AGAINST THE OTHER PARTY ONLY IN AN INDIVIDUAL CAPACITY, AND NOT AS A PLAINTIFF OR CLASS MEMBER IN ANY CLASS OR REPRESENTATIVE PROCEEDING, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION FEDERAL OR STATE CLASS ACTIONS, OR CLASS ARBITRATIONS. CLASS ACTION LAWSUITS, CLASS-WIDE ARBITRATIONS, PRIVATE ATTORNEY-GENERAL ACTIONS, AND ANY OTHER PROCEEDING WHERE SOMEONE ACTS IN A REPRESENTATIVE CAPACITY ARE NOT ALLOWED. ACCORDINGLY, UNDER THE ARBITRATION PROCEDURES OUTLINED IN THIS SECTION, AN ARBITRATOR SHALL NOT COMBINE OR CONSOLIDATE MORE THAN ONE PARTY'S CLAIMS WITHOUT THE WRITTEN CONSENT OF ALL AFFECTED PARTIES TO AN ARBITRATION PROCEEDING.
- 1.6 **Arbitration Procedure**. If you or Epson commences arbitration, the arbitration shall be governed by the rules of JAMS that are in effect when the arbitration is filed, excluding any rules that permit arbitration on a class or representative basis (the "JAMS Rules"), available at http://www.jamsadr.com or by calling 1-800-352-5267 (U.S. or Canada), or https://www.jamsadr.com/about/ or by calling +1-949-224-1810 (Latin America), and under the rules set forth in this Agreement. All Disputes shall be resolved by a

single neutral arbitrator, and both parties shall have a reasonable opportunity to participate in the selection of the arbitrator. The arbitrator is bound by the terms of this Agreement. The arbitrator, and not any federal, state or local court or agency, shall have exclusive authority to resolve all disputes arising out of or relating to the interpretation, applicability, enforceability or formation of this Agreement, including any claim that all or any part of this Agreement is void or voidable. Notwithstanding this broad delegation of authority to the arbitrator, a court may determine the limited question of whether a claim or cause of action is for an IP Claim, which is excluded from the definition of "Disputes" in Section 1.1 above. The arbitrator shall be empowered to grant whatever relief would be available in a court under law or in equity. The arbitrator may award you the same damages as a court could, and may award declaratory or injunctive relief only in favor of the individual party seeking relief and only to the extent necessary to provide relief warranted by that party's individual claim. In some instances, the costs of arbitration can exceed the costs of litigation and the right to discovery may be more limited in arbitration than in court. The arbitrator's award is binding and may be entered as a judgment in any court of competent jurisdiction.

You may choose to engage in arbitration hearings by telephone. Arbitration hearings not conducted by telephone shall take place in a location reasonably accessible from your primary residence, or in Orange County, California, at your option.

- a) Initiation of Arbitration Proceeding. If either you or Epson decides to arbitrate a Dispute, both parties agree to the following procedure:
- (i) Write a Demand for Arbitration. The demand must include a description of the Dispute and the amount of damages sought to be recovered. You can find a copy of a Demand for Arbitration at http://www.jamsadr.com ("Demand for Arbitration").
- (ii) Send three copies of the Demand for Arbitration, plus the appropriate filing fee, to: JAMS, 500 North State College Blvd., Suite 600 Orange, CA 92868, U.S.A.
- (iii) Send one copy of the Demand for Arbitration to the other party (same address as the Dispute Notice), or as otherwise agreed by the parties.
- b) Hearing Format. During the arbitration, the amount of any settlement offer made shall not be disclosed to the arbitrator until after the arbitrator determines the amount, if any, to which you or Epson is entitled. The discovery or exchange of non-privileged information relevant to the Dispute may be allowed during the arbitration.
- c) Arbitration Fees. Epson shall pay, or (if applicable) reimburse you for, all JAMS filings and arbitrator fees for any arbitration commenced (by you or Epson) pursuant to provisions of this Agreement.
- d) Award in Your Favor. For Disputes in which you or Epson seeks \$75,000 or less in damages exclusive of attorney's fees and costs, if the arbitrator's decision results in an award to you in an amount greater than Epson's last written offer, if any, to settle the Dispute, Epson will: (i) pay you \$1,000 or the amount of the award, whichever is greater; (ii) pay you twice the amount of your reasonable attorney's fees, if any; and (iii) reimburse you for any expenses (including expert witness fees and costs) that your attorney

reasonably accrues for investigating, preparing, and pursuing the Dispute in arbitration. Except as agreed upon by you and Epson in writing, the arbitrator shall determine the amount of fees, costs, and expenses to be paid by Epson pursuant to this Section 1.6d).

- e) Attorney's Fees. Epson will not seek its attorney's fees and expenses for any arbitration commenced involving a Dispute under this Agreement. Your right to attorney's fees and expenses under Section 1.6d) above does not limit your rights to attorney's fees and expenses under applicable law; notwithstanding the foregoing, the arbitrator may not award duplicative awards of attorney's fees and expenses.
- 1.7 Opt-out. You may elect to opt-out (exclude yourself) from the final, binding, individual arbitration procedure and waiver of class and representative proceedings specified in this Agreement by sending a written letter to the Epson Address within thirty (30) days of your assent to this Agreement (including without limitation the purchase, download, installation of the Software or other applicable use of Epson Hardware, products and services) that specifies (i) your name, (ii) your mailing address, and (iii) your request to be excluded from the final, binding individual arbitration procedure and waiver of class and representative proceedings specified in this Section 1. In the event that you opt-out consistent with the procedure set forth above, all other terms shall continue to apply, including the requirement to provide notice prior to litigation.
- 1.8 **Amendments to Section 1**. Notwithstanding any provision in this Agreement to the contrary, you and Epson agree that if Epson makes any future amendments to the dispute resolution procedure and class action waiver provisions (other than a change to Epson's address) in this Agreement, Epson will obtain your affirmative assent to the applicable amendment. If you do not affirmatively assent to the applicable amendment, you are agreeing that you will arbitrate any Dispute between the parties in accordance with the language of this Section 1 (or resolve disputes as provided for in Section 1.7, if you timely elected to opt-out when you first assented to this Agreement).
- 1.9 Severability. If any provision in this Section 1 is found to be unenforceable, that provision shall be severed with the remainder of this Agreement remaining in full force and effect. The foregoing shall not apply to the prohibition against class or representative actions as provided in Section 1.5. This means that if Section 1.5 is found to be unenforceable, the entire Section 1 (but only Section 1) shall be null and void.
